After the lunch meeting with Irene, I went back to the office to check in with my supervisor, and then ran to Rayburn HOB to attend the Lure of Europa Event! I've been waiting for this moment ever since Gabriel Rojas informed me about it. This event was held by The Planetary Society to increase awareness of Europa, the sixth closest moon of the planet Jupiter. Europa is an icy world made out of silicate rock in contact with oceanic water. The Planetary Society's CEO, Bill Nye, was there as well as the panel of speakers there to discuss the lure of Europa. This panel of speakers included a bipartisan mix of House members, the current Chairman of the House Science Committee, the Chief

Scientist of NASA, and one of the top Europa scientists in the country. The Planetary Society decided that it was time to raise awareness in Congress about the exciting possibilities of exploring this watery moon. I was so

When I arrived to the office on Wednesday, I had a project set up by a staffer and ready for me; the project consisted of writing letters and getting familiar with the office language. After I completed this project, later that day, I received another one from a

I enjoyed having back-to-back projects and staying busy. Friday's programming was a little different than usual; we started by visiting CQ Roll Call. CQ Roll Call is a privately owned publishing company that offers advocacy resources to take action. They are the source that

provides timely news, objective facts and analysis, and coverage of elections and the politics of legislation.

The conference room at CQ Roll Call was packed!

After CQ Roll Call, we left to the University of Phoenix. The two speakers were from National Hispanic Leadership Agenda (NHLA). I learned that NHLA calls for unity among Latinos around the country to provide the Hispanic community with greater visibility and a clearer, stronger influence in our country's affairs. NHLA brings Hispanic leaders together to establish policy priorities that address, and raise public awareness of the major issues affect the Latino community and the nation as a whole. Following the NHLA discussion, we had a panel meeting with five representatives from five congressional offices for a panel meeting. They emphasized both national and international issues that have a significant impact on the Hispanic community in the Untied States. We talked about issues such as

the border crisis and how their office is handling this issue. It was interesting hearing the staffers deliberate on the issue and learn how each office has a different take on the situation.

CAP challenges the media to cover the issues that truly matter, to form a nationwide discussion. The policy issues vary from LGBTQ to immigration. We ended programming at CAP.

I started off my Saturday by volunteering at Voto Latino as part of my group hours. We met with Danny Navarro who was coordinating the CHCI Voto Registration Workshop.
