
It has now been three weeks since I arrived in DC. Currently I am very excited with the work I'm doing at the White House Initiative! I currently have two projects I am


Tuesday, we had a breakfast get together of all the interns working with the other White House Initiatives. I learned there are 5 in total, and we also met the Under
