<u>Week 3</u> Perla Bravo


This week was by far the most interesting and eventful! On Monday afternoon I had



To be honest, I was most excited to see Justice Sotomavor. after having heard her story and knowing that she is the first Hispanic woman to be a Supreme Court justice, it was inspiring, and really neat to be able to see all justices in person. After the event I was able to get a signed copy of Sotomayor's book My Beloved World. I have begun reading it and enjoy the book so far. I hope to finish reading it before the end of my internship!
