## Weekly Journal 4

This week is potentially my most successful week here in the internship, and in my career. I feel like I made a number of career moves this week that have the potential to be big steps forward in my career.

On Tuesday I met up with Yesenia Chavez, a Legislative Assistant for U.S. Representative Raul M. Grijalva (AR-03). I met Yesenia at a previous event, the LGBT, Latinos & Elections Panel, where we both agreed to grab some coffee to continue our talk. She asked me to attend a press event that was going to be hosted by SNA with guest speakers Representative Bobby Scott (VA-03) and Representative Suzanne Bonamici (OR-01). I was able to create a memo for her about the press event and experience a press event about what I am passionate about: Education and Healthcare.

Veronica also asked me to accompany her and Morgan to escort schoolboard members from New York. We escorted this group to the Capitol where they met and spoke briefly with the one and only, Charles Schumer. That was my first time physically seeing Senator Schumer. Although I could not officially introduce myself to him, I will have my chance to do so on July 29, when all the interns will meet up with him for lunch.



The interns and I were able to meet with Mike Lynch, Schumer's Chief of Staff. During this lunch meeting, we learned about what it means to be Chief of Staff and what it all entails. The next activity we discussed sex, and we included abortion in the discussion as well. Sex is a taboo in the Latino community; it is not talked about much, which leads to great


